On behalf of the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE), I am pleased to advise you that the CCNE Board of Commissioners acted at its meeting on October 1215, 2021 to grant accreditation to the post-graduate APRN certificate program at Georgetown University for 10 years, extending to December 31, 2021. The accreditation action is effective as of March 29, 2021, which is the first day of the program's recent CCNE evaluation. You should plan for the next on-site evaluation to take place in the spring of 2031.

The program was considered by the Board using the CCNE Standards for Accreditation of Baccalaureate and Graduate Nursing Programs (2018).

At its meeting, the Board determined that the program met all four accreditation standards. The Board additionally determined that there are no compliance concerns with respect to the key elements.

As is required for all accredited programs, a continuous improvement progress report (CIPR) must be submitted at the midpoint of the accreditation term. Please note that the CIPR needs to demonstrate the program's compliance with the CCNE standards and key elements that are in effect at the time of its submission. As a courtesy, CCNE will send a reminder letter to the chief nurse administrator informing the program of the specific standards to be addressed and providing guidance for the preparation of the report. The deadline for submitting the CIPR to CCNE is December 1, 2026. The Report Review Committee, and then the Board of Commissioners, will review the CIPR. For more information about CIPRs and the report review process, please refer to the CCNE procedures.

As you know, the team report and the program's response to the team report are available to the institution in the CCNE Online Community. We hope that the results of the self-study process and the team report will be useful to the continued growth and development of the nursing program. Due to limited access to the CCNE office as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the certificate of accreditation will be mailed to you when operations permit staff to do so.

As previously conveyed by CCNE and in accordance with U.S. Department of Education requirements, CCNE is required to conduct an in-person verification visit, within a reasonable period of time, to all programs that have hosted a comprehensive virtual evaluation. CCNE will share additional information about this follow-up visit requirement at a later date.

On behalf of the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE), I am pleased to advise you that the CCNE Board of Commissioners acted at its meeting on October 1215, 2021 to grant accreditation to the master's degree program in nursing at Georgetown University for 10 years, extending to December 31, 2031. The accreditation action is effective as of March 29, 2021, which is the first day of the program's recent CCNE evaluation. You should plan for the next on-site evaluation to take place in the spring of 2031.

The program was considered by the Board using the CCNE Standards for Accreditation of Baccalaureate and Graduate Nursing Programs (2018).

At its meeting, the Board determined that the program met all four accreditation standards. The Board additionally determined that there are no compliance concerns with respect to the key elements.

The Adult-Gerontology Acute Care Nurse Practitioner (AG-ACNP) program at Georgetown University's School of Nursing is very fortunate to benefit from its partnership with the University of Maryland (UMD) Simulation Center in Baltimore, Maryland. The facilities and staff at UMD meet the needs of our faculty and students very well, allowing us to provide a productive learning environment with standardized patients, high fidelity simulation, and procedural training sessions.

In the event that we would be unable to continue our three-time yearly learning intensives at UMD, the program would be greatly challenged to find a center with the equipment, expertise, and space that we have experienced in Baltimore. Our own campus facilities in Washington, D.C. are currently very limited, with minimal opportunity for growth in terms of space. We have the support of four to five times the staff at our UMD intensives and several of those individuals are certified in educational simulation.

Georgetown University's School of Nursing partners with other entities and has built relationships with other simulation centers. The University of Maryland Simulation Center meets the needs of our Adult-Gerontology Acute Care Nurse Practitioner students best and we value our relationship with the simulation experts who work with us there; however, if the University of Maryland Simulation Center were not available, we would likely look to partnering with a MedStar facility in Washington D.C. or another institution with which we have a relationship. Since our students travel cross country for their experiences, we start discussions to plan these learning intensives with partners, including the University of Maryland Simulation Center, far in advance; while it would be disappointing and inconvenient, we would make alternative plans that would ensure that our students are able to meet necessary program requirements and competencies.

We hope that this has provided some insight into the importance of our relationship with the University of Maryland Simulation Center as well as our commitment to our students. We appreciate your support. Please do not hesitate to contact us with any questions.
